Course Description: The Autism program is designed to achieve academic growth on an individual basis in areas of Reading, English, Math, Science and Social Studies/Skills, including other goals as detailed in students' IEPs such as social, functional, and behavioral development.

Course goals

- o To meet or exceed students' annual IEP goals
- o To incorporate students' IEP goals into the general education curriculum as much as possible.
- o To meet or exceed goals established for Adequate Yearly Performance (AYP).
- I. Social Studies (Social Skills) To facilitate your child's development and independent application of a large variety of skills necessary to function adequately in their school, home, and the community.
- II. Writing To provide for your child to acquire basic writing skills required for success academically and in his/her career. This will involve spelling, punctuation, capitalization, subject/verb agreement, and the use of simple and compound sentences. This includes creating persuasive essays, daily journals, and narrative writing. This also includes memorizing or rehearsing each of his/her own personal identifiable information.
- III. Reading To provide for your child to acquire/improve reading skills and strategies for vocabulary building and comprehension. This will involve distinguishing between facts and opinions, interpretation of multi-meaning words, identifying and comparing main idea and important details, and predict story outcomes.
- IV. Math Solve problems, communicate reason, and make connections within the field of math. This will involve adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing of whole numbers, decimals, and fractions. Practical problems involving measurements and applications of basic math in real-world scenarios will be addressed.
- V. Science The focus is on understanding life, earth, physical, and scientific sciences and relate the information to everyday life experiences. This includes the rock cycle, minerals, plate tectonics, earth structure, weather, atmosphere, solar system, and the environment.
